

A gunfight in a 16th-century urban theater leads to the public unveiling of the most deadly weapon in human history. A brief interview with a renowned physicist theorizes that this gun is only the first in a possible sequence of increasingly powerful weapons. The classified project is called "Project Babylon" and it is happening at a location known as Area 51. Two years later, an unexpected attack on London leads to an evacuation of the city and escalating international tensions; but scientists make progress on several fronts, including nuclear fusion and advances in genetic engineering. One project in particular takes a disturbing new turn: "Project Babylon" has yielded a weapon that makes the atomic bomb look like child's play. [Taken from IMDb] A small group of soldiers and scientists led by Colonel John Ottway (Gary Sinise) on the eve of WWII travel to a secret underground lab where they discover a new weapon, which they dub 'Goliath', and their own doomsday device, an unprovoked attack on London proves to be their undoing.

The film was released on DVD and Blu-ray Disc on 29 September 2009 in the US and on 25 January 2010 in the UK. The film was also released at Digital HD format.

The film received negative reviews from critics. Review aggregator Rotten Tomatoes reports that 29% of critics gave the film a positive rating based on 107 reviews; the site's consensus states: "While it has an impressive pedigree and plenty of stars, "The Sum of All Fears" is a disappointing and overly familiar thriller." On Metacritic, the film has a score of 26 out of 100, based on 30 reviews, indicating "generally unfavorable reviews". J. Hoberman of "Entertainment Weekly" awarded the film a C rating and said that it was one of the year's most disappointing films. Owen Gleiberman of "Entertainment Weekly" awarded the film a C+ rating and said in his review, "The movie's in trouble before it's ever in gear. Its villains, in the form of two evildoers in masks who are well-known characters from previous Steven Spielberg films, aren't particularly inspired. So it feels to me like a film that has to be humiliated before it can be rescued. The bruised director must have felt this way because he's almost cruel enough to be making fun of himself." Roger Ebert gave the film one out of four stars. In his review, Ebert said that although the film was not a total failure it had been made with very little creativity. He went on to say that many of the actors, including John Travolta and Liev Schreiber, had been given a very weak screenplay to work with and did not do a good job. He did however admit that Travolta did an excellent job in his role. Amazon.com user Mark Siegers wrote in his review, "The characters are written poorly and you end up hating them all." Accolades
